OUR PEOPLE UNDERSTAND AND APPRECIATE THE CONCEPT OF P4D

Maria Aderaida Tusingwire, 35, hails from Bwegyerere Village, Kigyeyo Ward, Rubanda Town Council, Rubanda district. She is one of the community facilitators executing the P4D project in her community. She says before the ‘Giving for Change’ concept was introduced in her community, people would wait for their local leaders to fix every societal problem including trivial ones like; clearing bushes or removing sand washed down into the wells as a result of floods from the hills. During rainy seasons, the wells would be clogged with sand and dirt, and the locals would first push in sticks to create space to draw water.

On the other hand, Maria reveals that while fetching water, some children would also defecate in the wells, making the water unsafe for home consumption. However, ever since the inception of Giving for Change, communities now appreciate the value of keeping their water sources clean, because they know such resources belong to them, and not government.
